PhD in a rural setting- a blessing or a curse? Ferdinando Petrazzuoli and Donata Kurpas. We have been very fortunate in having some interesting and experienced people involved in the Forum and to give keynote addresses.

Ferdinando Petrazzuoli from southern Italy is the chair the EURIPA Scientific Board and for Scientific Committee for the e-Forum.



Fedinando joined EURIPA is 2006, introduced by the beloved and never forgotten Claudio Carosino, and has been involved in many initiatives, sometimes joint EGPRN EURIPA activities, over the past years. He is chair of the EURIPA Scientific Board.

Originally Ferdinando trained to be a Cardiologist but, when his father passed away, decided to change professions and took over from him at the family practice in his home village. Ferdinando lives and works in the same building which has its advantages and disadvantages: "You save time and money but are on call all the time. My patient list consists of nearly 1500 patients. Over 35% of my patients are over the age of 65. (Children under six years are cared for by the local health district paediatrician.) Many patients are farmers."

Ferdinando says that he has always been interested in research and has been awarded a Master of Science (MSc) in Primary Care & General Practice at the University of Ulster (United Kingdom) from October 2004-June 2008. Last year he defended his PhD thesis at the Centre for Primary Health Care Research, Department of Clinical Sciences in Malmö, Lund University, Sweden. Title of the thesis: Dementia management in European Primary Care.

Together with **Donata Kurpas** Ferdinando will also be presenting the finding from the EURIPA Covid-19 survey. Donata is chair of the EURIPA International Advisory board and also for the International Advisory Committee for the e-Forum. Donata is a full time senior researcher and lecturer at the Department of Family Medicine, Wroclaw Medical University. She is also a GP with specialisation in family medicine and public health, living and partially working in the countryside.



Donata says "EURIPA is for me hope for the voice of rural family doctors (so far excluded and unheard), but also the professionals working within community-based primary health care teams. I started working with EURIPA because I found here commitment to problems typical of rural settings, selfless support and consistent building of our European rural family."

Raising the profile of rural health and medicine is dependent on developing the evidence base and together Donata and Ferdinando will be presenting a key note address about the challenges of undertaking a PhD in a rural setting.

Our first key note address is by Bruce Chater and John Wynn-Jones, neither of who really need any introduction.

Bruce is Head, Mayne Academy of Rural and Remote Medicine, University of Queensland (<u>https://medicine-program.uq.edu.au/overview/mayne-academies/mayne-academy-rural-and-remote-medicine</u>), the Immediate Past Chair, Statewide Rural and Remote Clinical Network, Department of Health, Queensland; Medical Superintendent with Right to Private Practice, Theodore and Medical Director, Banana Health Service, Central Queensland Hospital and Health Service and is currently the Chair, WONCA Working Party on Rural Practice (Rural WONCA!)



John was the founder of EURIPA and its first president when it was established in 1997. He remains on the Executive Committee of EURIPA. More recently he is the Immediate Past Chair of Rural WONCA having worked with Bruce for many years.



Like Bruce, John has a long pedigree in rural health and was the founding director of the Institute of Rural Health in the UK in 1997. He is now on the board of the new National Centre for Rural Health and Care, a board member of PRIME Centre Wales (research centre focusing on primary & emergency care) and a member of the Rural Forum of the Royal College of General Practitioners.

We are also privileged to have a key note address from Professor Carol Holland and Katarzyna Nessler about International Collaboration in research.

Carol is a Professor in Ageing within the Division of Health Research at Lancaster University, and Director of the Centre for Ageing Research (C4AR). C4AR is a cross disciplinary centre that has members from across the university, working together, and with businesses, NHS, local government and the 3rd sector on the challenges and risk factors related to ageing.



Carol is a psychologist who focuses on applied impacts of cognitive and health psychology of ageing and models of frailty, for example, impacts of functional memory on ability to engage socially and so links to loneliness, or addition of social and environmental aspects of frailty to the more commonly measured physical aspects.

Carol has worked on a number of research proposals with EURIPA and associated colleagues, with an interest in the impacts of rurality on older adults with multiple morbidities and their carers.

Katarzyna is the current President of Vasco da Gama Movement (VdGM), European Young Doctors Movement of The World Family Doctors Organisation (WONCA). VdGM has a Liaison Officer with EURIPA and supports the Carosino Prize.

Katarzyna is currently an Assistant Professor at the Department of Family Medicine at Jagiellonian University Medical College in Poland. Family physician in a GP practice which takes care of over 4500 of adults and children in Kraków. She has broad research experience; she was a leader and participant in several national and international research projects.



Our final key note address comprises three members of the EURIPA International Advisory Board and will bring our perspectives form countries that do not make the headlines:



Oliver Lammel is our representative in Austria. He graduated from the medical University Graz. After the basic rotations he worked as an emergency physician at the flight base C14 at Niederöblarn. Due to the lack of free GP positions at that time, he underwent the training to become a physician. After two years as a consultant of internal medicine, he got the chance to build up a own practice at Ramsau am Dachstein (www.doclammel.at and is now a rural GP since 2011. He has also worked as a locum GP and A&E doctor in the UK including some remote and very rural areas.

Yelena Khegay is a family physician from Kazakhstan. She graduated from Kazakh National Medical University. After finishing her 2-year GP residency programme she worked for several years Project Coordinator, and later as a Study Investigator at Kazakhstan Association of Family Physicians (KAFP). Since 2014 Yelena is back to clinical practice and has been working as a general practitioner and a trainer at the postgraduate family medicine faculty. She is currently studying for a PhD. In 2018 Yelena was selected by WHO to become a part of WHO Primary Health Care Young Leader's Network through a highly competitive process. Yelena is a winner of WONCA Europe Scholarship 2020.





Our final speaker is Ana Kareli from Georgia. She has worked as a GP since graduating but also pursues her academic career and she lectures on what becoming a doctor and what family medicine is all about. She participates in faculty development meetings on adaptation of modern teaching methods. Ana takes an active part in making local protocols such as "Management of a suspected SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) case of infection in healthcare.

Ana says that since she first heard about EURIPA 2 years ago, working with them takes a huge importance in her life.
